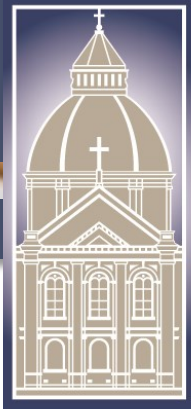

Stewardship Reflection

The great feast of Easter has begun, Christian stewards. Let us rejoice and be glad! Just as we embraced the discipline and fasting of Lent, let us fully embrace the joy and feasting that the next 50 days offer. We are called to be good stewards of the Easter season.

Our first reading, from Acts, gives instruction on how to do this. Here, St. Peter says that our Lord, "commissioned us to preach to the people and testify that he is the one appointed by God as judge of the living and the dead... that everyone who believes in him will receive forgiveness of sins through his name."

How do we ordinary people preach and testify to all God has done? We do so through how we live our ordinary lives — through the intentional use of our time, talent, and treasure for the kingdom of God. Putting God and others ahead of ourselves in every aspect of our lives is the most eloquent preaching we can do. Boldly and joyfully embracing a stewardship way of life is our most powerful testimony.

As Christian stewards, we are the modern-day witnesses of an incredible miracle prompted by unfathomable love — the death and Resurrection of our Savior for us. Let us rejoice and be glad and let's make sure our lives are a testimony to this amazing grace

Liturgy and Music Corner

The word "Easter" comes from Old English, meaning simply the "East." The sun which rises in the East, bringing light, warmth, and hope, is a symbol for the Christian of the rising Christ, who is the true Light of the world. **The Paschal Candle** used during the Easter Vigil is a central symbol of this divine light, which is Christ. It is kept near the ambo throughout Easter Time and lit for all liturgical celebrations.

The Easter Vigil is the "Mother of All Vigils" and Easter Sunday is the greatest of all Sundays. The season of Easter is the most important of all liturgical times, which Catholics celebrate as the Lord's resurrection from the dead, culminating in his Ascension to the Father and sending of the Holy Spirit upon the Church. The octave of Easter comprises the eight days which stretch from the first to the second Sunday. It is a way of prolonging the joy of the initial day. There are 50 days of Easter from the first Sunday to Pentecost. It is characterized, above all, by the joy of glorified life and the victory over death expressed most fully in the great resounding cry of the Christian: Alleluia! All faith flows from faith in the resurrection: "If Christ has not been raised, then empty is our preaching; empty, too, is your faith." (1 Cor 15:14)

"What you sow is not brought to life unless it dies. And what you sow is not the body that is to be, but a bare kernel of wheat, perhaps, or of some other kind;...So also is the resurrection of the dead. It is sown corruptible; it is raised incorruptible. It is sown dishonorable; it is raised glorious. It is sown weak; it is raised powerful. It is sown a natural body; it is raised a spiritual body. If there is a natural body, there is also a spiritual one. So, too, it is written, "The first man, Adam, became a living being," the last Adam a life-giving spirit. But the spiritual was not first; rather the natural and then the spiritual. The first man was from the earth, earthly; the second man, from heaven. As was the earthly one, so also are the earthly, and as is the heavenly one, so also are the heavenly. Just as we have borne the image of the earthly one, we shall also bear the image of the heavenly one." (1 Cor 15:36-37, 42-49)

The Exsultet: The Proclamation of Easter

*"Be glad, let earth be glad, as glory floods her, ablaze with light from her eternal King,
let all corners of the earth be glad, knowing an end to gloom and darkness."*

Happy Easter! Rejoice and be merry and share laughter and good times at Easter, for the Son of God has set us free and free indeed. Happy Easter! Christ's empty grave is proof that no matter how bad things may seem, there is always hope for a new day. May God revive all your hopes this Easter. Happy Easter!

Next Sunday: Divine Mercy Sunday



“Jesus said to Sr. Faustina one day: ‘Humanity will never find peace until it turns with trust to Divine Mercy’ (Diary, p. 132). Divine Mercy! This is the Easter gift that the Church receives from the risen Christ and offers to humanity at the dawn of the third millennium.”

**St. John Paul II,
Divine Mercy Sunday Homily,
April 22, 2001**

Mankind’s need for the message of Divine Mercy took on dire urgency in the twentieth century, when civilization began to experience an “eclipse of the sense of God,” and therefore, to lose the understanding of the sanctity and inherent dignity of human life. In 1931, Jesus appeared to Sr. Faustina in Poland and expressed his desire for a feast celebrating his mercy. The Feast of Mercy was to be on the Sunday after Easter and was to include a public blessing and liturgical veneration of His image with the inscription “Jesus, I trust in You.”

This promise of mercy has been affirmed by the Church, which has made Divine Mercy Sunday an occasion for receiving a plenary indulgence, “the remission before God of the temporal punishment due to sin whose guilt has already been forgiven” (CCC, no. 1471). The plenary indulgence is granted to the faithful under the usual conditions (Confession, Eucharist, prayer for the intentions of the pope, and complete detachment from sin, even venial sin). The faithful may either take part in the prayers and devotions held in honor of Divine Mercy in any church or chapel or recite the Our Father and Creed in the presence of the Blessed Sacrament exposed or reserved in the tabernacle, adding a devout prayer to the merciful Lord Jesus.

There are many aspects of the Divine Mercy devotion, including the Chaplet, the Divine Mercy image, and the “hour of great mercy” (3:00 p.m.). The popularity of these devotions, focused on the Lord’s infinite mercy, has grown rapidly in recent decades. Regarding the Chaplet of Divine Mercy, St. Faustina wrote that Jesus said to her, “At the hour of their death, I defend as My own glory every soul that will say this chaplet; or when others say it for a dying person “ (Divine Mercy in My Soul, no. 811).

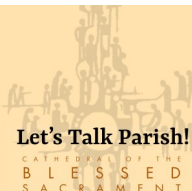

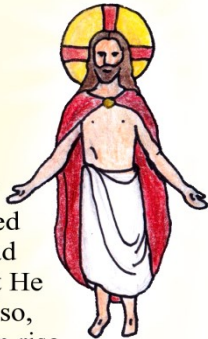

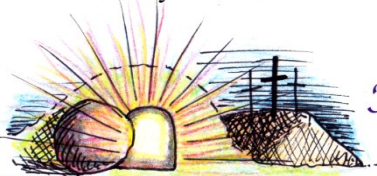
Kids' Corner *Happy Easter!* Esquina de niños **Alleluia!**

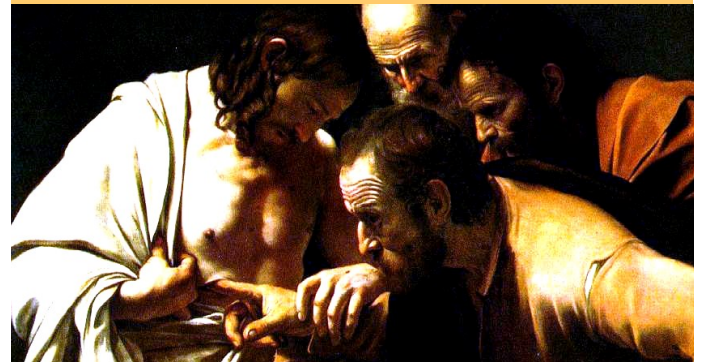

Family Bible Moment

In last Sunday's preparation for this weekend's readings, we had a glimpse of the hope of the Resurrection when the Angel appears to the women at the tomb. He is Risen as He said! Alleluia! Throughout the Easter Season, we will continue to reflect on the Saving power of the Resurrection. Looking ahead to next week—Divine Sunday—we have before us "Doubting Thomas" who needed physical proof of Jesus' Resurrection before he would believe. Jesus tells us "Blessed are those who do not see and have believed."

Read next Sunday's Gospel, John 20:19-31

- When Jesus first appeared in his glorified body to the disciples after His resurrection, Thomas was not with them. When he came back and the disciples told him what happened, he didn't believe right away, but wanted proof. What are things we seek proof of before believing? Or, are we like 'doubting' Thomas?
- In our Creed, we pray, "...He suffered death and was buried, and rose again on the third day..." (Easter). How do you know the Resurrection is true?



Resurrexit! Sicut Dixit! (He is Risen as He said!) Alleluia!

Our Lenten journey came to an end on Saturday night, Easter Vigil, as we gathered with the Elect and Candidates to guide them in their reception of the Sacraments of Baptism, Confirmation and Holy Eucharist. It began with the blessing and lighting of the Paschal (Easter) Candle. The light of the Candle—representing Christ the Light—was then dispersed among the faithful, symbolizing for us of the victory of Christ over death has shattered the darkness of sin. The Light was later shared with the newly baptized with the words, "Receive the Light of Christ", as the Baptismal Candles were passed from Godparent to the newly Baptized.

Our Church celebrations are full of symbols to help us—who do well to have external, physical signs—grasp the unseen, spiritual realities. Just as water is used to speak to our senses of the cleansing of sin at Baptism, the passing of the lit candle speaks to us of the illumination Christ brings into the hearts of all who receive Him as He is: the Son of God. What symbols do you recall from our gathering at Church? In the Sacraments, in our songs, in our being together?

Eucharistic Adoration & Divine Mercy

Adoration is the Catholic tradition of praying before the Blessed Sacrament exposed in a monstrance.

(A monstrance is a beautiful sacred vessel for holding and displaying the Eucharist.) While a holy hour is traditional, you can go even for a few minutes, especially if you have young children. In our fast-paced, media-saturated culture, time spent in peaceful adoration helps children become comfortable with silence, and fosters in them the disposition of awe and wonder. Finally, adoration reminds us how important self-sacrificial love is to our Faith.

Another Catholic Tradition (although a more recent one) is the Divine Mercy Chaplet. The 2nd Sunday of Easter is Divine Mercy Sunday, a time we reflect on God and His Mercy. Try to pray the chaplet together before Jesus in the Blessed Sacrament. Jesus I Trust in You.



Adoración Eucarística y Divina Misericordia

La adoración es la tradición católica de rezar ante el Santísimo Sacramento expuesto en una custodia. (Una custodia es un hermoso recipiente sagrado para sostener y exhibir la Eucaristía). Si bien la hora santa es tradicional, puede ir incluso por unos minutos, especialmente si tiene niños pequeños. En nuestra cultura acelerada y saturada de medios, el tiempo dedicado a la adoración pacífica ayuda a los niños a sentirse cómodos con el silencio y fomenta en ellos la disposición de asombro. Finalmente, la adoración nos recuerda cuán importante es el amor abnegado para nuestra Fe.

Otra tradición católica (aunque más reciente) es la Coronilla de la Divina Misericordia. El segundo domingo de Pascua es el Domingo de la Divina Misericordia, un tiempo para reflexionar sobre Dios y Su Misericordia. Trate de rezar la coronilla juntos ante Jesús en el Santísimo Sacramento. Jesús, en ti confío.

A Glimpse of Spirituality 靈修一瞥68 (John若 17:24-26) Fr. Abraham Chiu 趙必成神父

We get so many questions about life and death. Sometimes, we are overwhelmed by the grief of death and we do not see the hope of eternal life. Is Jesus' promise of life true? Are we chosen by Jesus as the children of God the Father and no longer slaves of the devil?

The account of Jesus' final evening with his disciples encourages us to look further into the resolution of the many questions concerning life and death. The answer is insisted by Jesus' love which is the revelation of God. In short, we must read on to discover how this happens in the life and death of Jesus.

This love in Greek is *agapē*, denoting self-giving love. God the Father gives himself to the world through Jesus Christ who gives himself to us on the cross. Thus, if we give our lives to Jesus, we will be in him, at the same time, dwelling in the bosom of God the Father.

This prayer of departure instructs us that Jesus makes God known in the perfect love and unfailing care he shows for his fragile disciples, even Judas the traitor. In and through his love, Jesus is glorified, and God is glorified in him. In God, we will find eternal life because we are to be recognized as the sent ones of Jesus by the unity created by the love we have for one another.

Finally, this short passage indicates Jesus' first request which offers hope to all believers. It transcends our life in the world that we might behold the glory the Son possessed before the foundation of the world, if we do believe in Jesus while we are still alive.

擺在人面前的，有許多關於生與死的問題；有時，人心被死亡悲痛所淹沒，看不到永生希望。耶穌對生命的應許是真的？是否基督徒都被耶穌召叫作天父兒女，不再是魔鬼奴隸？

在耶穌與門徒度過的最後一個夜晚，他鼓勵信徒進一步看透生死。耶穌強調，他對人的愛是天主的啟示；簡言之，生死都在愛里尋求答案。

“愛”在希臘語是 *agapē*，表示自我交付，天父通過耶穌基督將自己交給世界，耶穌在十字架上將自己交給我們。因此，如果我們將生命獻給耶穌，就會住在他內，同時住在天父懷抱裡。

這離別祈禱告訴信徒，耶穌以完美的愛和關懷，面對脆弱門徒，甚至出賣者猶達斯，好讓天主被眾人認識。在他愛，並通過他的愛，耶穌獲得光榮，天主也因他得到光榮。光榮就是，在天主內人們找到永生，因為通過彼此之間的愛所創造的共融合一，告訴世界我們都是耶穌派遣來的門徒。

最後，這段簡短經文表明耶穌給所有信徒帶來希望，這希望超越人的塵世生命，如果還在活著的時候已經相信耶穌，就可以看到聖子在創世之前與聖父共同擁有的光榮。
