



Communion of Saints (Part II): Relics and The Veneration of the Dead.

It is our union with the infinite merits of Christ that accomplishes our salvation, and we renew that union every time we participate in the mass. Our human frailty and weakness are strengthened by our communion with the Body and Blood of Christ every time we receive the Holy Eucharist; we are also strengthened by our Eucharistic communion with each other. By our Baptism and our renewed Eucharistic communion we become more deeply joined in a fraternal love, which is why Jesus taught His disciples to "Love one another. By this shall all men know that you are my disciples, if you have love one for another" (John 13:35). If it is not always an emotional love, it is nevertheless a divine love that binds us together, and it is stronger than death. For that reason, the Church has always believed that we are intimately connected with one another by the deepest fraternal bonds, for the love we bear to one another is a divine love, and it reaches beyond the grave.

We see this illustrated when a member of our family dies. The surviving family members promise never to forget their departed loved one and promise always to cherish their memory. For example, we preserve photographs and personal items that our loved ones have touched, for in touching these things we feel in some small way that we are touching them, in kissing or embracing their photograph we feel that we are embracing them, and in this manner we find a measure of consolation in our sense of loss. However, while these mementos or "relics" are unspeakably valuable to us, we never mistake them for that actual person, much less do we possess any superstitious loyalty to them as we would to the actual person. They merely serve as a connection point to those we cannot be with at this present moment.

It is the same with the household of faith. We cherish the memory of the faithful departed and prayerfully remember them at every mass, especially we reverence the memory of those who lived as heroic examples of the Catholic way of life; namely, those we call "Saints". The relics of the Saints, the things they were known to have touched, their personal possessions, and especially the fragments of their mortal remains serve to connect us in a concrete way to the memory of these heroes of our sacred history. These relics remain with us as a proof that the Saints once walked this earth, and any miracles or wonders associated with the relics of the Saints verify that they were indeed holy and favored by Heaven. One might say that an afterglow of grace rests on the relics of the Saints, and to acknowledge that is not superstitious, but rather flows from the fundamental truths of our faith.

An Old Testament illustration of the way in which a saint's remains preserve more than a mere memory of their life comes from the story of the miracle worker prophet Elisha. At the time of his death Moabite raiders were harassing the Israelites living in the rural parts of the country far from the relative security of the cities. On one occasion a group of men happened to be burying a man near the grave of Elisha. When they spotted a Moabite raiding party nearby they decided to hide the dead man's body in the tomb of Elisha until they could return at a later time and bury him properly. However, when the dead man's body came into contact with the remains of Elisha, the dead man revived immediately. (2nd Kings 13:20-21) The grace and anointing of Elisha's life adhered to his relics, and the dead man became the beneficiary of that grace after the prophet had died.

Saint Thomas Aquinas




Priest, Doctor of the Church

Feast Day: January 28 — St. Thomas Aquinas was born in Aquino, a town in southern Italy from which he takes his surname. In his masterwork, *Summa Theologica*, he represents the pinnacle of scholasticism, the philosophical and theological school that flourished between 1100 and 1500 and attempted to reconcile faith with reason and the works of Aristotle with the scriptures.

The family of Thomas Aquinas was a noble one, his parents, the Count of Aquino and Countess of Teano, were related to Emperors Henry VI and Frederick II, as well as to the Kings of Aragon, Castile, and France. During his early education, Thomas exhibited great acumen in the medieval trivium of grammar, rhetoric, and logic. Because of his high birth, Thomas' entry into the Dominican order in the early 1240s was very surprising. His family employed various means to dissuade him from his vocation, including imprisoning him for two years.

After a stint as a student in Paris, Thomas made his way to Cologne to teach, receiving ordination to the priesthood in 1250. Soon after this, he was assigned to teach at Paris, where he also worked toward his degree of Doctor of Theology, which he received in 1257, with his friend St. Bonaventure, after some intramural political difficulty. The remainder of his life was spent in prayer, study, and writing his great *Summa Theologica*, a systematic attempt to present the findings of scholasticism. Although Thomas is sometimes perceived simply as an analytical and methodical writer, he was, especially in his later years, given to periods of mystical ecstasy. During one such experience, on December 6, 1273, he resigned from his writing project, indicating that he had perceived such wonders that his previous work seemed worthless.

The *Summa Theologica* was left unfinished, proceeding only as far as the ninetieth question of the third part. St. Thomas Aquinas died a few months later, on March 7, 1274. He was canonized in 1323 by John XXII. Although interest in Scholasticism in general and Thomism in particular waned during the seventeenth and eighteenth centuries, Leo XIII's encyclical *Aeterni Patris* in 1889 reestablished Thomism as the leading theological school of the Catholic church. Today, Thomist theology stands at the center of the Roman Catholic tradition.

Christian Symbols

The anchor was an early Christian symbol commonly found in the Roman catacombs as a symbol of the hope we have in Christ beyond this life, and is a fitting inscription for a Christian tomb. The symbol doubtless comes from this verse: "We have this hope as an anchor for the soul, firm and secure. It enters the inner sanctuary behind the curtain, where Jesus, who went before us, has entered on our behalf. He has become a high priest forever, in the order of Melchizedek." (Hebrews 6:19-20) The anchor is found in the first, second and third century epitaphs of the catacombs.

Editorial: Our task for the next four years

The symposium at The Catholic University of America, in which a bishop and cardinal shared the stage with organized labor and academics exploring themes of social justice, was an important and timely step in returning the church in the United States to a right relationship with the culture, especially workers, and themes essential to human dignity.

After reading Julie Bourbon's account of "Erroneous Autonomy: The Dignity of Work," sponsored by the Institute for Policy Research & Catholic Studies at Catholic University of America, we urge you to read the full text of speeches by Bishop Robert McElroy of San Diego and Boston's Cardinal Sean O'Malley.

McElroy, who is emerging as the most eloquent U.S. episcopal interpreter of the economic and social justice vision that Pope Francis has espoused, framed not only the discussion at the conference, but the conversation we must have as a faith community at this time in American history.

With confirmation hearings for Donald Trump's Cabinet appointees the backdrop for the Catholic University event, McElroy said, "We are poised to witness in the United States a return to public policy which moves aggressively to establish market mechanisms within ever more expansive realms of national life."

Denunciations of the unfettered market are as old as Catholic social teachings, and have been key features of papal teaching from Pope Paul VI's *Populorum Progressio* ("On the Development of Peoples") through Popes John Paul II and Benedict XVI. Francis' unique eloquence has renewed focus on the issue. He has said that those who defend trickle-down economic theories and assume that free markets and all economic growth bring greater justice demonstrate "a crude and naive trust in the goodness of those wielding economic power and in the sacralized workings of the prevailing economic system."

McElroy spells out the way forward: "The church must work in the coming months with unions, workers, the elderly and the poor to counter the growing imperialism of market mechanisms within American public life."

If the symposium represented a step in the right direction, it also indicates the distance that has grown between current church leadership and the convictions that once were second nature to members of the bishops' conference. In 1986, after years of consultation with theologians and economists, the U.S. bishops issued a pastoral letter, "Economic Justice for All," that was a deep treatment of the topics dealt with during the recent symposium. In June 2012, with the U.S. still wobbling from the economic meltdown of 2008, the bishops appointed a committee to write a statement with a working title of "The Hope of the Gospel in Difficult Economic Times: A pastoral message on work, poverty and the economy." It did not have an auspicious beginning.

That was a presidential election year and the economic plan for the Republican ticket, Mitt Romney and Paul Ryan, would cut taxes, reduce non-defense spending and move toward privatization of Medicare and Social Security. A number of bishops did not want their pastoral message to become too political. Some warned against implicitly criticizing Republican budget policies. Archbishop Joseph Naumann of Kansas City, Kan., asked that the message note the importance of the private sector in job creation.

When presented at their November meeting, the statement failed to pass because of opposition from a few bishops who remembered the 1986 statement. The new statement, in fact, made no reference to "Economic Justice for All." Retired Archbishop Joseph Fiorenza of Galveston-Houston denounced the 2012 draft pastoral as a betrayal of Catholic social teaching.

Despite its title, the 2012 document devoted only a single sentence to the right of workers to organize. "I fear that this draft, if not changed in a major way," will harm the U.S. bishops' record on Catholic social teaching, Fiorenza said. It would be "lambasted" in the Catholic academic world, he said.

Many in church leadership today would be happy with a pastoral statement on work that makes no mention of unions and welcomes a greater reliance on market forces. Fr. Robert Sirico, who heads the Acton Institute, a prominent free-market think tank, knew he would face little episcopal backlash when he described on Twitter McElroy's talk as "economic illiteracy posing as piety."

At the Catholic University event, Richard Trumka, AFL-CIO president, warned that over the next few years "we will be tested," and the best advice came from theologian David Cloutier: "Organize or die."

What we must do over the next four years, if not easy, is clear. We must dig deep into our Catholic social teachings to re-establish our foundations. We must stand with the working class, the elderly, children and the poor. We must form alliances with unions and community organizers, and advocate for public policies that say "Thou shalt not" to an economy of exclusion and inequality."



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
